Never feed or approach bears!



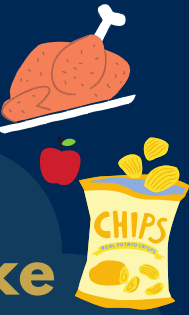
IF YOU SEE A BEAR stay calm and **DO NOT** run or play dead.

Speak to the bear in a calm, but assertive voice.

Slowly back away. Make sure you are in safe area and that the bear has an escape route.

It is illegal to harass wildlife and punishable by fine in the State of Colorado. Harassment can include gathering around, pursuing, or trying to take pictures with bears.

Anything that smells like food attracts bears.



Keep BBQ and grease traps clean with ammonia, bleach or a degreasing agent.

Protect your garden: compost properly.



Pick fruit from trees, clean up fallen fruit, or donate what is left.

Never leave food unattended.
